"You say you need an outreach van? Let's do it!"

The Friends of Hands On Hartford, a group dedicated to supporting the work of HOH and the people we serve through special projects and initiatives, are doing great things to support our Hartford Community. With the kickoff of our new Homeless Outreach Program, the Friends decided to focus their efforts this year on the work we're doing around housing and homelessness, and though we're only halfway through the year, their impact has been great!



They started the year attending a virtual Faces of Homelessness speaking event, hearing from **Ralph Gagliardo** whose story (like those of all of our speakers) is moving and very close to home, and who engages with his audiences with courage, honesty, and great insight. Next they attended another virtual event where they heard from **Janet Bermudez** and **Stephanie Boyce** about our outreach program – connecting one person at a time with folks living unsheltered outdoors to help them get the assistance they need to move toward permanent housing.

The big question the Friends asked at that meeting was: "What do you need to be as effective as possible?" The three answers had to do with safety (a handful of reflective vests so that team members can be can be more easily identified as outreach workers there to help), trust (toiletries, snacks, Dunkin gift cards, and other much-appreciated items put together in outreach kits to help establish a trusting relationship with folks they encounter), and one last big request: an outreach van so that team members can travel together, and be able to respond immediately if any of the folks they meet are ready to come in from the cold (or heat) at a moment's notice.

Wow, did we get a response! Right away, one of the members called a friend who donated 15 outreach vests. Many of the Friends signed up to put together outreach kits (stay tuned for next month's newsletter to hear about an amazing

giving circle organized around this project) and are scheduled to continue to deliver them throughout the whole year. And, not only did they take on the van request, they raised the funds to pay for the van and a year's expenses in a matter of weeks!

What's next for this group? They are planning a fall Faces of Homelessness speaking event where they can invite friends and colleagues to help spread the word about the challenge of homelessness in this area. Stay tuned as we announce the date of that event. In the meantime, we are grateful every day for having the ongoing support of the Friends of Hands On Hartford.

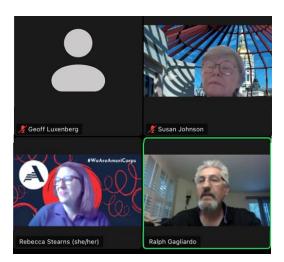


Shared Kitchen Business Spotlight

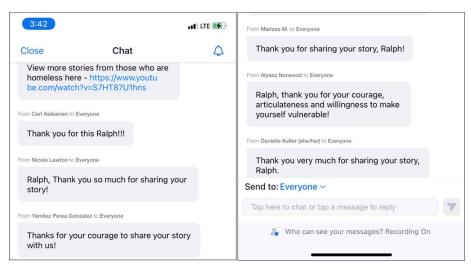
Here are kitchen members **Chris Rue** and **Malcolm Beckwith** from **The Dads Kitchen**. Chris shared that "The
